HEBREW HIGH SCHOOL

If you haven't registered yet for next year's Hebrew High School classes, please do so at your earliest possible convenience. The Hebrew High School offers a wonderful opportunity for post B'nai Mitzvah teens to continue learning about Judaism in a comfortable, friendly and fun environment. The once weekly program (but ok to come when you can) provides a forum for spirited discussions and lectures about topics relevant to teenagers and their interests while socializing with friends over pizza.

The Hebrew High Committee encourages all current 7th graders and other post Bar/Bat Mitzvah teens to register for Hebrew High for 2007-2008. The 8-10th grade class meets Wednesdays from 5-7PM and the 11-12th grade class meets on Thursdays from 5-7.

TUITION IS FREE FOR 8th GRADE STUDENTS and only \$180/year for older students.

May saw the end of this year's Hebrew High School program. Once again congregant volunteers came to the classroom to share their area of interests with the students. Our thanks to Jim Ohls who talked to the students about his trips to Israel to visit his wife's family. Eli Unger lead the final classes on Thursday as the students wound up their year with him learning more about current events in Israel and more conversational Hebrew. Rabbi Tayvah was on hand to lead sessions for Thursday's class.

Wednesday's class invited the 7th grade students to their final two sessions. At the first shared class the 7th graders were introduced to congregant Judi Turkheimer who lead a thought provoking coaching session about being Jewish. At the last week of class Susan Waskow hosted a year end party with her students and the 7th grade students and teacher. In addition to the standard pizza dinner, Gayle Holtzman provided festive party snacks to munch while the class was in session. Susan lead the students in a rollicking game of the Jewish version of Apples to Apples.

I would like to express the Hebrew High School committee's appreciation to all the people who have helped with the program this year. Thank you to the people who purchased pizza for the dinners in each session: **Susan Krisiloff, Elaine Donoghue, Natalie London, Harlene Rosenberg, Carrie Fischman, Tom Berger, Lisa Kent, Gayle Holtzman, George Cohen, and Jake Fridkis.**

Thank you to our dedicated staff of teachers and congregant volunteers for their enthusiastic participation. They are at the heart of the program. Their ideas shape the curriculum and their wisdom and experience add a unique dimension to the education of our teens. Each week our adult leaders introduce a topic of debate or present new information to the students.

I would like to thank each of them individually. **Rabbi Tayvah** teaches in both the Wednesday program and is one of the main teachers for Thursday's class. He has covered a wide variety of topics with the students this year. For example, discussions included the topics of civil liberties, and the Enemy's combatant bill, the rituals of conversion, the Talmud, marriage, and much more.

Eli Unger teaches the other half of Thursday's HHS class. Eli has eagerly introduced his students to conversational Hebrew, through having them conjugate verbs, count to 4,000, and try to read an article from an Israeli newspaper. He has given them an introductory course of the history of Israel and discussed Israeli current events.

Our primary teacher for Wednesday's class is congregant volunteer **Susan Waskow**. Susan has been the backbone of this year's Wednesday program. Each week she comes to class prepared to share something new with the students. She has posed a wide variety of questions for discussion. Some of them were: What is the difference between "what is ethical" and "what is legal", "If you don't believe in God, can you still be Jewish?" "If you could meet one person from any point in history, who would you want to meet and why?". Susan also makes time for the lighter side by playing the popular board games Apples to Apples – the

Jewish version, of course, - and taking the students outside for a game of Frisbee.

As a life coach, **Judi Turkheimer**, offers a unique perspective of teaching to her class. She asks the class what topic they would like to explore, then listens, asks questions, and offers observations, reflections, and feedback. She encourages the students to reflect on their thoughts, choices, and responsibilities. In Judi's class, discussion topics have included: "What is God?" how would you define a loser and why, "When is a joke funny and when is it offensive."

In addition to our regular adult leaders, this year we have had the added bonus of several congregant volunteers who have come into the classroom to lead a discussion. Many, many thanks to **Jeremy Lerner**, who shared his life story of growing up in Wales after WWII and his conversion to Judaism with both sessions, and to **Jim Ohls** for discussing living in Israel w/the Thursday's class and to **Jeremy Perlmutter** for his help with Wednesday's session.

I would like to thank the HHS committee members, **Natalie London, Harlene Rosenberg, and Gayle Holtzman**, for their dedication, vision, and hard work. Their commitment to the program is the glue that holds everything together.
