From the Rabbi

RENEWING OUR DAYS



*Hashiveynu Adonai
eylecha v'nashuva.
Chadesh yameynu
kekedem.*

Return us to You, Adonai, and we will return. Renew our days as of old.

These words that conclude the book of Lamentations, or *Aicha*, are read on Tisha B'Av, literally, the ninth of Av, the date commemorating the destructions – roughly 500 years apart – of both the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem. *Aicha*, the first Hebrew word of the book, which translates as an imploring “How?”, takes us on a journey of emotions, see-sawing between anger and remorse, despair and forgiveness. In graphic detail almost too painful to read, *Aicha* recounts the tale of the first destruction by the Babylonian Empire in 586 BCE. On Tisha B'Av, we fast from sundown to sundown; we enter our sanctuaries and sit together on the floor – a sign of mourning – and we listen as the plaintive tones of the Book of *Aicha* are chanted.

Return us to You, Adonai, and we will return. Renew our days as of old. What does this mean? How do we emerge from this valley of tears, from the trauma of destruction and exile that forever changed our destiny as a people?

Two ways. First, in the short term, we emerge during the seven weeks that follow Tisha B'Av, leading up to Rosh Hashanah. Known as the “seven weeks of comfort”, the *haftarot*, or prophetic readings for these seven weeks prophecy Israel's redemption and a world of peace, justice, and mercy. Each of these readings helps us to climb from the depths of Tisha B'Av up to the renewal of Rosh Hashanah, the birth of the world, and the chance at *rebirth* for each individual.

In the long term, we emerge through faith in the Rabbinic decree that the Messiah will be born on Tisha B'Av. Tisha B'Av, then, raises us up out of the ashes of destruction and gives us hope. Hope for a rebuilding of community; hope for *tikkun olam*, the repair of our broken world; and hope for the conviction that human social progress is possible. Rabbi Arthur Waskow teaches that the words, “renew our days as of old” do *not* mean “give us back the good old days.” Rather, they mean to “make our days full of newness as You did

long ago.” After the long lament, the end of *Aicha* means to fill us with the hope, strength, and intelligence to imagine new ideas and discover bold solutions to our problems. The end of *Aicha* means to fill us with a renewed sense of energy with which to rebuild our communities, care for ourselves and our loved ones, and participate in the betterment of the larger world. Renew our days as of old.

Tisha B'Av falls this year on August 10th. Whether you choose to read Lamentations, sit on the ground and fast or not, take a moment that day to remember the despair that gripped our people so long ago. And take a moment to think about how this year you will harness your *own* hope and potential for our community, Congregation Kehilat Shalom. Join our new fundraising committee; come to movie night, adult education classes or Friday night services; teach a class for Kehi-Loft, our new student-designed Hebrew High School; or just come and hang out at our Sunday morning bagel café and get to know your fellow congregants. I hope to see you all soon. Enjoy the rest of the summer.
