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IF NOT NOW, WHEN?



At this time of year in our Torah cycle, we read the story of our liberation from slavery in Egypt, as well as of the mystical moment when we gathered at the foot of Mt. Sinai to receive the Torah. Whether these events happened or not, or unfolded in the exact way they are told in the Bible is not that important. What is important is that it is around these events, these acts of Redemption and Revelation, and their endless telling and retelling, that we begin to cohere as a people.

Who could have imagined thousands of years ago that we, a tiny group of clans and tribes, would disperse across the globe, spreading our stories and teachings, as well as absorbing many of the ideas and customs of the surrounding cultures in which we lived? From Jerusalem to Baghdad, from Paris to Shanghai, from San Francisco to Santiago, from Moscow to Tunis, we Jews come in many shapes and sizes, and with as many variations in ritual and practice. Yet, through it all, two things have remained constant: our *sifrei torah*, or torah scrolls, and our *batei kneset*, or synagogues, in which our *torot* have been housed. For centuries, we Jews have been gathering together in our synagogues to pray, to study, to socialize, and to chant Torah. Notwithstanding the vast architectural variations over time and place, and aside from the layers upon layers of interpretations and commentaries, our synagogues and our Torah have been the centerpiece of our communities for two millennia.

Last month, two very important letters went out from Congregation Kehilat Shalom. One was from the Religion Committee Chairs and myself regarding one of our torah scrolls which was recently damaged in a fall. Since it is customary when such a mishap occurs not only to *repair* a damaged torah, but also to take measures to *honor* it and what its teachings stand for, we will be undertaking as a community an exciting program combining study, fasting, and *tzedakah* in order to rededicate our torah scroll. **On Sunday January 25th**, please join your fellow members here at CKS as we share a potluck luncheon and learn through video, music, and hands-on experience about how torah scrolls are made. Sign up this month in the CKS lobby for one day to fast during the week leading up to the program. Plus, bring in your canned goods or other non-perishable food items to be donated to those less fortunate than ourselves. I strongly urge you to participate in any or all of these activities. As we say before each Torah service begins: *Tnu chavod latorah*, "Let all give honor to the Torah." Let us honor ourselves, our Torah, and our precious community, CKS.

The second letter was from our Board President, Matt Rosenthal. This letter involves the other constant in Jewish history, namely, the synagogue... in this case, *our* synagogue, CKS. As Matt stated clearly, CKS still needs substantial donations in order to bridge a budget gap. This budget gap was *not* unanticipated. It was approved by the congregation as a necessity to balance our budget at our last annual meeting. In these troubled economic times, it is difficult to ask for additional funds.

But, *it is in these same troubled times now more than ever* that we need to turn to each other for comfort and support, in celebration and in sorrow.

CKS is now thriving and bustling with activity: whether it's adult education on a Sunday morning in the sanctuary while our children learn to bake challah in the kitchen; a group of dedicated committee members planning for the next holiday on a weekday evening while our teens socialize and learn about their heritage in our balcony; or our trope tutor chanting torah with one of our bnei-mitzvah students while our hard-working Board meets late into the night. Whatever the activity - movie night, Shabbat service, or car wash - **CKS is our spiritual home. We need our community right now as much as our community needs us.** As Rabbi Hillel said nearly two thousand years ago: "If I am not for myself, who will be for me? But, if I am only for myself, who am I? And, if not now, when?" Please help us balance our budget. Give what you can. Every little bit helps.

This month was filled with learning and fun. The kindergarten through fourth grade classes danced Israeli dances like "Yesh Lanu Tayish" with Debbi Grauer and learned to sing the songs while they were dancing.

The fifth through seventh grade classes reviewed the trope that they know (Etnachtah and Mahpach) and they learned Pashtah. Ariel Kramer, Jeremy Bilotti and Marissa Applegate helped to teach Trope this month.



Fifth and seventh graders made Hanukah cards for soldiers overseas. The seventh graders also made personalized cards on the internet to send to soldiers overseas at www.LetsSayThanks.com. The Kindergarten through Second Grade class made pictures with Menorah and candle stickers. The Third and Fourth Grade Class decorated huge sivonim with handprint menorahs and Hanukah stickers and stamps.

Our entire school had fun making and eating Sufganiyot with Josh during cooking. We also played with sivonim that day and brought home chocolate gelt.

Our teen helpers (toranim) helped with everything this month from teaching Hebrew to moving books out of the attic and organizing them to be used by the teachers. They made photocopies, ran the office, collected and counted the Tzedakah, ran crafts projects in each room, took pictures, and made learning fun. Our teachers are delighted with the help and are reporting better Hebrew proficiency than ever before.

Some of this is due to all of the teen help and some of it is due to our outstanding attendance. Very few students have been leaving early and we have almost complete attendance every week. The students are more successful when they have regular attendance. Successful students are happy students. The parent volunteering is also making a huge difference. We have at least 3 parent volunteers every week and sometimes as many as 10! Thank you for a great 2008! *Dori*





December was another active month for the Kehi-Loft students. The students met three weeks for class before winter break.

George Cohen led two sessions on the law. The students had the opportunity to choose a current issue that they wanted to debate. They selected Israel and

Iran as well as the pros and cons to lowering the legal drinking age. They broke into groups to work on their arguments and then presented their cases before the "judge" for the verdict. Many thanks to George for leading these interesting sessions. The students are eager to have him return, which he agreed to do in the new year.

Congregant volunteer, Lisa Kent, led a session on marketing. The students worked on developing a marketing plan for Kehi-Loft. They debated various ways to promote the high school program at CKS and agreed on a plan. They will work on their project over the next several weeks and hopefully present it to the 6th and 7th grade classes one Sunday morning during Hebrew school in January.

Rabbi Susan led two sessions on Jewish identity. Paralleling the adult ed interfaith life programming, the rabbi and the students talked about what kinds of questions they might ask a potential convert. This evolved into a discussion about how we, as Jews, function in the larger society. The second Jewish identity class focused on being Jewish in December. The students shared their personal experiences, such as how it feels to be in a school concert singing Christmas carols, and how they react to holiday parties and concerts in school.

I worked with the students on plans for the future with regards to the physical space and the class schedule. Lots of ideas were tossed around about how to finish the loft. Instead of staining the new interior wall sections, they all agreed to a more creative solution. They will paint the wall with their own artwork. Several students volunteered to submit some ideas to the group at the next class. Maybe they will paint scenes from the Torah, or possibly each student will take a small section to paint, or maybe they will decide to paint one panel and leave the others blank for future Kehi-Loft classes to paint. I'll keep you posted.

In addition to the discussions about the loft space, I made some suggestions to the class schedule which they voted on. Although, the Kehi-loft program has good attendance, the students often have other commitments during the week. A Sunday session will offer an alternative day for those with Wednesday commitments. Once a month Sunday evening classes will begin in January. Class schedules will change too to reflect the students desire to have more time to work on their CKS project ideas and to socialize. From now on, there will be one adult led discussion each week instead of two.

On December 17th, the students had a Hanukkah party for the last part of class. They opted to play Apples to Apples instead of dreidel, but a good time was had by

all! The Kehi-Loft students continued to help out at CKS. This month they pulled books and other items from the attic closet so they could be sorted by Matt Rosenthal and his helpers. Many thanks to Tom Berger, George Cohen and Lisa Kent, the parent volunteers who picked up dinners this month.
