Bulletin from the Board- Debbie Gartenberg



Tikkun Olam (repairing the world) and Fundraising are key components to the ongoing success of Congregation Kehilat Shalom. While each has a different focus, each provides an opportunity for the participation and growth of our congregation, our community, and the larger community in which we live. As Chairperson of these committees, I would like to provide you with an update.

Every non-profit organization needs fundraising to make ends meet. Our budget this year is over \$500,000. Expected dues are approximately \$200,000. We get some income from Kinderchapters, and a small amount from other sources, but we rely heavily on donations and fundraising to close the budget gap. We took a leap of faith this year and renovated the bathrooms. Aren't they a great improvement? Most of you pitched in - 65% of our community donated toward this one-time project. On behalf of the Board and the Rabbi, we wish to sincerely thank all of you who helped make the restroom renovations possible.

What we are now facing financially is the need to generate funds for the remainder of this fiscal year. We will still need your donations to our operating fund, and we will need your support - both with time and finances - with our fundraisers. The two main fundraisers for this year are the annual **Rummage Sale** and the **Spring Event**. We will be collecting items for the sale from Sunday, October 19th - Wednesday, October 22nd. The sale dates will be the Thursday Evening Members Preview (new this year) on October 23rd, Friday, October 24th and Sunday, October 26th. Many volunteers will be needed to make this sale a success. Come join us - it is really a lot of fun!

The Spring Event will be held in early March. If you would like to be on the planning committee, please contact me at dgart1518@gmail.com. Once the date is announced, we hope that you will put it in your calendar and plan on attending! This is always fun, and not to be missed.

We would like to have other smaller fundraisers throughout the year. If you have any ideas, or would like to plan one, please contact me! Ideas and volunteers are always welcome.

The biggest event for Tikkun Olam is when we host about 35 children from HomeFront, an organization in Trenton that helps people - mainly families with children - fight homelessness. This event occurs in May, and everyone - the kids from HomeFront and CKS volunteers alike - has a great time. More information will be coming once we start planning. If you have never helped out with this event, please consider joining us next May. If you have any ideas for other Tikkun Olam projects, please contact me.

No organization can survive without both time and effort from its members and donations throughout the year. CKS is a second home to so many of us. It is a place to worship, learn, educate our children, make friends, socialize, pursue and be uplifted by our Jewish values. Please, as we enter the New Year, resolve to find ways that we each can contribute to ensure that CKS continues to thrive.

Message from the Rabbi



There are few Jewish prayers that are as earnest and as heartrending as *Avinu Malkeinu*. Standing with the *kahal* – the congregation – on Rosh HaShana and Yom Kippur, we sing out:

*Avinu, Malkeinu,
chaneinu va'aneinu,
ki ein banu ma'asim.
Aseh imanu tzedakah va'chesed,
vehoshiyeinu.*

We are calling to God from a place of humility, 'Our Father, our King, be compassionate with us and answer us, because we have no deeds. Treat us with charity and loving-kindness, and save us.' Traditionally, '*ki ein banu ma'asim*' is translated as 'we have no acts of merit' (to avert a harsh decree), but the literal translation is inescapably, 'we have no deeds'. What could this possibly mean, to be without an act to our name?

Two weeks ago, on Sunday, September 14, I attended a screening of the film *Broken on All Sides*, along with 90 Jews from local Reconstructionist, Reform, Chabad, and Conservative synagogues. The film, a documentary that seeks to uncover the injustices of the American justice system, shared some painful truths: how in the past 30 years, the U.S. penal population has exploded from 300,000 to more than two million, even while crime rates have gone down; how the U.S. incarcerates more of its citizens, per capita, than any other country in the world; how the U.S. imprisons a larger percentage of its Black population than South Africa did at the height of Apartheid; how people of colour are not significantly more likely to use or sell illegal drugs than white folks, but that they are made criminals at drastically higher rates for precisely the same acts.

These general statistics of the justice system were paired along with more palpably painful details: how jails and prisons across the U.S. are overcrowded, with people sleeping three to a cell, or crowded like sardines on the floors of gymnasiums; how mice and rats and roaches are everywhere; how people can be held for months in these conditions before being brought to trial.

The film also features Michelle Alexander, a brilliant civil rights lawyer and author of *The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness*. In one of the most moving moments of the film – moving in the sense of causing a shift in perspective – Alexander says plainly, 'All of us are criminals. There's not a single one of us who hasn't committed some crime.'

Alexander's words struck home for me, because she's right. Even if we are the most law-abiding of citizens, there's not one of us who hasn't jaywalked at one time, or driven above the speed limit, or worse. It's not

a question of whether we've committed a misdemeanor or a crime, but whether we've been caught. And the difficult reality of our justice system is that we are more likely to be watched, caught, accused, and sentenced if we are people of colour, poor people, or both.

If all of us have committed 'crimes', then we cannot rely on our 'deeds' to separate out the innocent from the guilty. As we stand before the Creator in the Days of Awe, all we can ask is that God see the essential spark of holiness that exists within each of us – felon and free person – and love us despite our flaws, despite our deeds and misdeeds. And, as we grow beyond the High Holy Days, may we not only be inscribed with compassion in the Book of Life, but may we also find the holiness within ourselves to see the holy spark in every other. Shana tova.
